600g	800g	Potato rinse
22,5ml	30ml	Tamari Sauce
3	4	Line-caught Swordfish Fillets
15ml	20ml	NOMU Seafood Rub
150ml	200ml	Srirach Mayo (37,5ml [50ml] Mayo, 90ml [120ml] Low Fat Cottage Cheese & 22,5ml [30ml] Sriracha Sauce)
60g	80g	Green Leaves rinse & finely shred
8g	10g	Fresh Chives rinse & finely slice

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Seasoning (salt & pepper)

Cooking Spray

- 1. SOY-BAKED POTATO Preheat the oven to 220°C. Cut the potato in half lengthways and place on the tray don't remove the skin! Lightly coat in cooking spray, the tamari sauce, and turn cut-side down. Bake in the hot oven until the flesh is soft and the skin is crispy, 40-45 minutes. Alternatively, air fry at 200°C until crispy, 35-40 minutes (shifting halfway.)
- 2. FISH When the roast has 10-15 minutes to go, place a pan over medium-high heat and lightly add cooking spray. Pat the swordfish dry with paper towel. When hot, fry the fish until golden and cooked through, 2-3 minutes per side (depending on the thickness of the fish fillet). In the final 30-60 seconds, spice with the NOMU rub. Remove from the pan and season.
- 3. SOME PREP Using two forks, gently shred the swordfish and add to a bowl. Mix in the sriracha mayo, the green leaves, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the chives. Mix until combined and season.
- 4. DINNER IS READY Dish the potatoes, cut-side up, top with the creamy sriracha fish mixture, and garnish with the remaining chives. Well done, Chef!

**Chef's Tip** A fork or fish spatula works best for gentle flaking, or use your hands once the fish has cooled slightly.
